Andrew Jameson was successively sheriff of 3 different areas of Scotland and was raised to the Scottish Bench as Lord Ardwall in 1905. JB's biography charts a generally contented life.

The UK edition of this work is listed under A52 in Blanchard. A US edition in 4 volumes was published but Houghton Mifflin also produced an Autograph Edition which was bound in 8 volumes but retained the pagination of the 4-volume edition. The books are bound in light blue paper-covered boards with a black cloth spine and a green paper title label with gold lettering. The outer and lower edges are uncut. Each volume has a colour frontispiece and the autograph page in volume 1 is, of course, signed by JB. This set is number 192 of 500, stated on the reverse of the title page. Unlike the UK edition, the US edition includes a lengthy introduction by Major-General James Harbord, who was the American Expeditionary Force chief of staff during WWI. The set is in very good condition with just occasional small scuff marks. Internally very good and the number of pages which remain uncut suggests they have never been read. Blanchard

The History of the Royal Scots Fusiliers (1678-1918) 1925

A history of the regiment from its formation to the end of World War 1. There is brief reference to the death of the author's brother Alastair at the Battle of Arras in April 1917.

A comprehensive account of the contribution of this division to the British campaign during World War I. Chapters deal with the battles of Loos, Arras, the Somme and Ypres and with the German offensive and the closing stages of the war. The 10 appendices cover, amongst other matters, casualties, battle orders, honours and awards and much detail concerning the battle of Loos.

The Causal and the Casual in History 1929

The text of the 1929 Rede Lecture. All published by Cambridge University Press.

There is a former owner s signature on the front fly-leaf, his bookplate being on the pastedown, and loosely inserted is a letter to him thanking him for the loan of the book 50 years after the lecture. A limited edition of 300 copies published by the Book Club of California. It includes the text of an address given by JB at the Scott Centenary celebrations in Selkirk and an essay by Walter C van Antwerp on Joseph Train, a friend of Scott and a diligent collector on his behalf of Border folklore and legends.

A comprehensive and scholarly biography of our 'chief of men' (Milton). In my view JB shows a better understanding than most of the extent to which Cromwell s Christian faith was a driving force in his life. 9454 First US edition. Published by Houghton Mifflin 1934. Reduced from £12 to £7 The spine is faded and lightly worn at the ends; very good throughout otherwise.

The King's Grace 1935

A celebration of 25 years of the reign of King George V.

8561 Second large paper edition. Published by Hodder & Stoughton (1935). Reduced from £12 to £7 There is light browning across the upper quarter of the covers and the cream cloth is very slightly soiled in places. The book is bright internally.
